Mesa Artspace Lofts Grand Opening Jan. 23 Invites Public to Tour Open Studios and Hear Live Music Within Newly Opened, \$15.8 Million Arts Hub in Downtown Mesa



Minneapolis, November 20, 2018— Artspace invites the public to the January 23, 2019, Grand Opening of the **Mesa Artspace Lofts** (155 South Hibbert), a \$15.8 million arts development in downtown Mesa, AZ. The arts complex includes 50 units of fully leased housing where artists and their families live and work, with nearly 50 children currently residing within; as well as a courtyard, playground, gardens, outdoor stage, pet run, and on-site offices for A New Leaf. Just a few blocks away from the world class Mesa Art Center, and accessible by the new light rail, the Mesa Artspace Lofts contributes to the reinvigoration of downtown Mesa and the East Valley as a destination for the arts and innovation.

The Grand Opening, which is free and open to the public, will take place 4 to 8 p.m. Wednesday, January 23. Events will showcase the talents of the artists living in the Mesa Artspace Lofts, including open studios and live music by residents including ventriloquist-rapper Zack Beard and Fuzzy (the puppet); Mister Stitch's Radio (aka Daniel Coon); musician-poet

Loryn (aka Lorin Drexler); poet Isarae Koval; comedian Faith Morris; musician-poet Therosia Reynolds; painter Gina Ribaudo-Delap (live painting to music performances); DJ Ronnie Digital (aka Ronnie Sunday); musician Tina Vale; vocalist Alejandra Valenzuela; and writer Michelle Ann Vincent (reading her work to a dance choreography). RSVPs are encouraged via www.artspace.org/mesa.

Preceding the Grand Opening will be a panel discussion at 1 p.m. at the Mesa Art Center, "Inclusion, Innovation and Arts Leadership," moderated by Cindy Ornstein, Director of Arts and Culture for the City of Mesa and Executive Director of the Mesa Arts Center. Panelists will include Jen Cole, Director of the National Accelerator for Cultural Innovation and Inclusion at ASU and Chief of Staff to ASU's Dean of Herberger Institute for Design and the Arts; Jaime Dempsey, Executive Director of Arizona Commission on the Arts; Miki Garcia, Director of the ASU Art Museum; and Ralph Remington, Deputy Director of Arts & Culture, City of Tempe, and Producing & Artistic Director, Tempe Center for the Arts. This event is also free and open to the public, with registration encouraged via www.artspace.org/mesa.

"We are thrilled that this beautiful, open, and inviting space is now home to so many artists and their families," said Heidi Zimmer, Artspace Senior Vice President, Property Development.

The Mesa Artspace Lofts—a LEED for Homes development intended for the Mesa arts community—was developed by the Minneapolis-based nonprofit organization, Artspace, in partnership with the Neighborhood Economic Development Corporation (NEDCO). Comprised of 4,350 square feet, the new construction by Architectural Resource Team features a variety of



housing types including two story lofted spaces with balconies, an expansive courtyard with native plantings, and outdoor workspace and performance space. The all white color palate subtly reveals the southwest environment throughout the day as shadows constantly change the texture of the building. The use of white also acts as a blank canvas for future murals. The project's facades are a reaction to their cardinal orientation. The use of the saw tooth form on the Hibbert Street building helps prevent direct sun exposure on the large windows in the vaulted loft apartments. This sculptural form creates an urban rhythm for the streetscape. Within the courtyard there are a series of outdoor amenities intended to promote collaboration amongst artists. An Artspace entry gate, created by salvaged and repurposed materials, was designed by Jason LeBrash of Grizzly Iron and Stephen Azarik of Architectural Resource Team.
